- f. Park Parties
 - i. Probably will never go back to the park parties of the past
 - ii. Partnering with summer schools again like last year
 - 1. Kids will go out for a break and be surprised with a park party with inflatables, games, etc.
 - 2. They are meeting up with the kids who need to know about literacy the most
- 3. Approval of October Minutes
 - a. Lydia: motioned to approve
 - b. Erin S.: 2nd the motion
 - c. Minutes approved
- 4. Celebration Cinema
 - a. See previous information under "Partnership Prizes"
 - b. Judy Blume was interviewed on the TODAY show saying that the movie was better than the book.
- 5. Summer Reading Prize Ideas
 - a. Allison B: Children museum year membership (about \$100)
 - i. She was able to have the "expiration" date extended from August to August instead of a year from purchase date
 - b. Erin S: Zoo year membership
 - i. The year begins when the pass is activated by the patron
 - c. Allison B: Their Meijer gift cards were by far the most popular prize followed by Grand Haven 9 gift card
 - d. Diana: Experience based prizes tend to be the most popular
 - e. Paige: Some places will give libraries a deal (like 50% off or BOGO)
- 6. Summer Reading Round Robin
 - a. Autumn: 1000 hours outside program that was presented at Spring Institute is something their library is starting
 - b. Shannon: is calling their 1000 hour outside "Inside Out"
 - c. Jessica: They had local teen authors come in to host writing workshops for their teens
 - d. Mary: Spring Institute had a segment on Storytime on the Farm. Their library is partnering with their local tree farm to host a Christmas in July program on July 25
 - e. Melissa D (I think): Hosting a "be a hero at your library" program
 - i. This will be a community clean-up program where people will clean up alongside super heroes like Wonder Woman
 - f. Shannon: Bottle cap mosaic with patron donated bottle caps
 - g. Lydia and Melissa: Progressive take and make painting projects
 - i. June: Patrons will be able to pick up the canvas and paints
 - ii. July: Patrons will get colored glue and string
 - iii. August: Patrons will get a bunch of misc stuff to add like buttons

- h. Shelly: Carnival of Kindness
 - i. Take and make kindness themed kits
 - ii. Collecting items to donate
 - 1. For babies- new socks
 - 2. For food pantry- canned food goods
 - 3. For animal shelter- canned animal food
- i. Erin S: construction at the library- keeping stuff simple
 - i. Last year they did quiz questions where kids/teens put their answers to the question in a bucket and they received credit on READsquared (even if their answers were incorrect)
 - ii. This year they are having a kindness thermometer. When a kids does something kind the thermometer fills up
- j. Chris: During school visits she did a mad lib and the students loved it. She had stuff like "name 2 people" or "a slang word for hello". The kids found it funny when the story had the word "Bussin' " in it
- k. Mike:
 - i. Decoration idea that they are using was based off the book "Mixed: A Colorful Story" by Arree Chung. They are outlining a city in their stairwell, and patrons will be able to place colored dots to create a colorful city
 - ii. On Beanstack kids can earn activity credit for doing acts of kindness
- I. Nicole: Decorating idea- They are giving out white gingerbread people outlines and the kids will decorate them. After they are decorated the gingerbread people will hung up around the library for display
- m. Erin S: Idea from LEGO Librarian- Mad Lib story: Kids are given a mad lib to create. Once the mad lib was filled out each kid was given a sentence they had to create using LEGOs.
